

Forty years ago, a group of institutions created the consortium of Caribbean universities, UNICA. Coinciding with the academic institutionalization of the so-called area studies, and the professionalization of the studies of the region, UNICA constituted at that time a sort of ecology of Caribbean knowledge.

Times have changed; the Caribbean has changed; knowledge, the ways of generating it and the ways of sharing it have changed. UNICA, therefore, must also change accordingly. The new purpose of a regional consortium of universities should now be to constitute a Caribbean ecology of knowledge.

The meeting will take place at the University of Puerto Rico, Mayagüez Campus on November 14 to 16, 2007.
